REGULAR MEETING HELD IN THE COUNCIL ROOM AT 7:00 P.M.

Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

LEWISTON YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL UPDATE

The update from the Lewiston Youth Advisory Council was postponed to a future meeting due to their end of the school year schedule.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

The Chief of Police addressed the public and commented on the fight and death in Kennedy Park on June 12. He said this is an active investigation being conducted by the State Police and they are still interviewing witnesses and working on this matter but it will take time. The Mayor then opened up the floor for public comment:

- 1) Nick, 48 Maple Street - Stated Mr. Giusti was his best friend who did not deserve to die; suggested having the curfews apply to sidewalks as well as the park; establishing a neighborhood watch program because everyone feels unsafe
- 2) Charles Soule, 135 Bartlett Street - the park is usually quiet at night; the actions of one person should not reflect changes for an entire group
- 3) Chastity, resident of Auburn - - her daughter was in a fight in Kennedy park in May, she said the fight was video taped but still look a long time for police to act; more communication is needed between white residents and Somali residents; there is a lot of hate talk on facebook that needs to stop
- 4) Casey Gram, 36 ½ Shawmut Street - does not know what is happening downtown; 11 year old shot with a BB gun last week; works 50 hours a week, goes to park to relax, let kids play; police do not do enough about fights in town; lots of bikes stolen in downtown; protests will not solve anything
- 5) George Hamilton, Ash Street - police department is a wonderful asset but juvenile law is limiting; poor parenting creates the problems; need community support; volunteerism; lots of kids on the streets by themselves
- 6) Jay Allen, property owner - he fears this will turn into a racial issue, don't let it; people hanging out in park all hours of the night means they don't have a job, a family or dreams; people who have those three things are not hanging out in the park; people have no guidance; native Lewiston vs. immigrants - need to work together for one community.
- 7) Kim Psuich - Horton & Walnut Street - social media has a huge negative impact; race baiting; more needs to be done; citizen empowerment; if establish a curfew at the park, it will just push people to other places to gather; they need personal responsibility; lots of unsupervised children in park; everyone fighting; add more cameras to park

- 8) Steve, 21 Roland Avenue - thank you to the police for the work they do; parenting is the problem, not the police
- 9) Susan Colton, 81 Ash Street - there will be a gathering at Marcotte Park called Stand for Peace and information will be available soon
- 10) Pauline Gudas, 6 Raymond Avenue - there already is a curfew on the books for minors, parents need to follow it and police need to enforce; downtown people need to take responsibility; lucky to have park - recent \$2 million upgrade with another \$2M planned in a few years; residents need to take pride in area, community
- 11) Christine, downtown resident - works at community gardens, see people fighting all of the time; think where their anger is coming from; city of highly traumatic people; people don't have access to resources to provide for a good life for family; substandard housing causes anger, rage, poverty; struggling people, drugs; need jobs, healthcare; reserve judgement on parenting; have empathy
- 12) Amanda Gram - 36 1/2 Shawmut St - can't even walk around safely; recent murder in daytime; Knox St is more dangerous than the park
- 13) Melissa Dunne, 254 Blake St - asking for respect for deceased and family; text messages to people offering help; listen to thoughts and emotions; what would it take to feel safer?; need bystander training; know rights; time to process grieving
- 14) Honey, 183 Pine Street - cannot rush the healing; work together on streets

The Police Chief stated there is a curfew for minors but the police need to have the involvement of parent and the community to work together.

At this point, the Mayor closed the Public Comment period and then announced a ten minute recess. Once the Council reconvened, the Mayor then took agenda item 7 out of order and addressed it at this time.

RESOLVE EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR THE AVANGRID/CENTRAL MAINE POWER COMPANY'S NEW ENGLAND CLEAN ENERGY CONNECT PROJECT

Charles Soule of 135 Bartlett Street asked if any of the City Councilors owned stock in CMP and asked why the city would trust a line from Canada for power.

VOTE (167-2018)

Motion by Councilor Cloutier, seconded by Councilor Lysen:

To approve the Resolve Expressing support for the AVANGRID/Central Maine Power Company's New England Clean Energy Connect Project:

Whereas, the State of Massachusetts recently solicited proposals for the provision of clean energy for distribution throughout that state; and

Whereas, CMP's New England Clean Energy Connect transmission project has been selected by Massachusetts as the successful proposal; and

Whereas, a portion of this project will be located within the City of Lewiston, including a station that will convert direct current to alternating and portions of a new power line that will transport this electricity through Maine; and

Whereas, the new power line will use an existing utility corridor and will not require additional or expanded right of way; and

Whereas, CMP's investment in Lewiston for this project is estimated at about \$250 million, which will substantially expand the City's tax base and assist in mitigating the City's property tax rate; and

Whereas, the construction phase of the project is projected to run through 2022 and will support additional jobs in Maine and in Lewiston; and

Whereas, the availability of 9.5 terawatt hours of additional electric power in New England will help to offset anticipated generating retirements and will increase the overall availability of electricity to our region; and

Whereas, additional supply will result in lower energy costs, with CMP estimating \$3.8 billion in energy related savings over the first twenty years of project operation; and

Whereas, it is likely that this additional hydro based energy will reduce the use of current fossil fuel generated capacity, leading to the reduction of 3 million metric tons of annual carbon emissions in New England; and

Whereas, CMP has also worked to mitigate project impacts and has recently signed a memorandum of understanding with the non-profit Western Mountains & Rivers Corporation to support conservation and nature-based tourism in that region of Maine; and

Whereas, the City has enjoyed a close and harmonious relationship with Central Maine Power and has recently worked closely and successfully with CMP on the Maine Power Reliability project as it affected the City of Lewiston; and

Whereas, this project will be required to receive permits and approvals from a variety of agencies including, among others, the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, Land Use Planning Commission, and Public Utilities Commission, as well as the United States Army Corps of Engineers, and ISO New England; and

Whereas, these regulatory agencies will evaluate the project in detail and measure it against their individual standards and requirements;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Lewiston that in light of the significant benefits this project will bring to Lewiston, Maine, and New England, and while recognizing the need for a wide range of permits and approvals from various state and national entities, we hereby express our support for Central Maine's Clean Energy Connect Project and call upon all individuals and entities playing a role in the regulation and approval of this project to act expeditiously and to work with AVANGRID and the Central Maine Power Company to ensure that the necessary permits and approvals are granted.

The Mayor opened the public hearing to receive citizen input and comment. No members of the public spoke for or against this issue. The Mayor then closed the hearing.

To conduct a public hearing on an application for an outdoor entertainment event for Pettingill Park, and to grant a permit for an Outdoor Entertainment Event, as required by the City Code of Ordinances, Chapter 10, Article 1, Section 10-3, for an outdoor music concert to be held at Pettingill Park on Thursday, September 27, contingent upon positive recommendations from the Police Department, Fire Department, Code/Health Officer and Land Use Inspector regarding compliance with all regulations and compliance with all City ordinances. PUBLIC HEARING AND FIRST & FINAL PASSAGE REGARDING AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE FOR AN AMENDMENT TO THE PARKS & RECREATION ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH A STANDARDIZED TIME OF 10:00PM FOR THE CLOSURE OF KENNEDY PARK

The Mayor opened the public hearing to receive citizen input and comment. George Hamilton of Ash Street said this is the best option for now and said it is important to note that permitted and sponsored events are still allowed. Melissa Dunne of 254 Blake Street expressed concerns about homeless teenagers and she advised the Council to not equate crime with poverty and poverty with crime. The Mayor then closed the hearing.

That the proposed amendments to the City Code of Ordinances, Chapter 54 “Parks and Recreation” regarding the change in time for the closure of Kennedy Park from 1:00am to 10:00pm, receive first passage by a roll call vote and to continue the public hearing to the next regularly scheduled City Council meeting. Passed - Vote 7-0

PUBLIC HEARING AND FIRST PASSAGE TO CONTRACTUALLY REZONE THE PROPERTY AT 163 BATES STREET FROM THE CENTREVILLE (CV) DISTRICT TO THE DOWNTOWN RESIDENTIAL (DR) DISTRICT

The Mayor opened the public hearing to receive citizen input and comment. No members of the public spoke for or against this issue. The Mayor then closed the hearing.

VOTE (176-2018)

Motion by Councilor Lysen, seconded by Councilor Rea:

To approve First Passage of the amendment to the Zoning and Land Use Code and Map to contractually rezone the property at 163 Bates Street from the Centreville (CV) District to the Downtown Residential (DR) District, subject to a contractual agreement. Passed - Vote 7-0

CONDEMNATION HEARING FOR 12 FAIR STREET

David Hediger, Director of Planning and Code Enforcement, and Tom Maynard, Code Enforcement Officer, provided their professional background credentials regarding their working knowledge of building codes and building safety. Mr. Hediger and Mr. Maynard then reviewed the City’s efforts to communicate with the building owners and to work with them to resolve the numerous outstanding safety violations. They then outlined the condition of the building noting it is unsafe for habitation and is a danger to the neighborhood. They also showed photographs documenting the code violations and safety concerns. No members of the Council personally know the property owner and therefore do not have a conflict of interest for this hearing.

David West, an attorney was present representing the mortgage holder Wells Fargo. He said the bank is working with the property owner who is an active duty military member. Mr. West asked to have additional time to allow the bank time to evaluate the property for repairs or to allow for demolition. He said they would know within 60 days.

RESOLVE ESTABLISHING AN AD-HOC ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON RENTAL REGISTRATION

VOTE (178-2018)

Motion by Councilor Cloutier, seconded by Councilor Lysen:

To approve the Resolve Establishing an Ad-Hoc Advisory Committee on Rental Registration:

Whereas, the City has discussed the possible implementation of a rental registration program for some time and such a program is recommended in the City's comprehensive plan; and

Whereas, recently, a subcommittee of the Lewiston Area Public Health Committee has worked with staff to develop a program that was subsequently presented to the City Council at a workshop; and

Whereas, at that workshop, a variety of individuals spoke for and against all or various elements of the program; and

Whereas, it has become clear that additional thought and evaluation was required prior to the City Council reaching a decision as to whether or not such a program should be adopted and, if adopted, what that program should consist of; and

Whereas, the Council is now interested in establishing a group made up of various interested parties to undertake such an effort;

Now, therefore, be It Resolved by the City Council of the City of Lewiston that there is hereby established an Ad-Hoc Advisory Committee on Downtown neighborhood Action.

1. Purpose.

The purpose of this committee shall be to investigate whether the City should or should not adopt a rental registration program and to report its findings and recommendations to the City council. The Committee is hereby charged with defining and agreeing on program goals, establishing resource and staffing requirements to meet these goals, recommending whether such a program should be pursued and the nature of that program, and determining how such program should be funded and implemented.

2. Duties. The committee shall

- a. Discuss and define the goals of such a program;
- b. Outline the resources and staffing levels required to meet these goals
- c. Recommend whether such a program should be adopted by the City Council and, if so, to specify the nature of that program
- d. If recommended, to determine how such a program should be funded and implemented

3. Composition and Appointment. The Committee shall be composed of seven regular members to be appointed by the Mayor as follows:

- a. Three individuals who own multi-family properties in Lewiston;
- b. The Director of Planning and Code Enforcement;
- c. An employee from the City's Code Enforcement Division;
- d. An inspector from the City's Fire Prevention Office;
- e. A representative of the Police Department familiar with issues related to multi-family housing;

- f. A representative of Healthy Androscoggin;
- g. A representative of the Lewiston Auburn Public Health Committee

In addition, up to two members of the City Council may be appointed by the Mayor as ex-officio members.

The Mayor shall designate one member of the Committee to serve as Committee Chair.

- 4. Vacancies. Should a vacancy occur on the Committee, the vacancy shall be filled by the Mayor in accordance with the requirements of section 3 above.
- 5. Term. The Committee shall submit its final report and recommendations no later than December 28, 2018, at which time it will cease to exist unless its tenure is extended by action of the City Council.
- 6. Staff Support. The City Administrator and/or his designee shall be responsible for supporting the work of the committee and handling the Committee’s logistics.
- 7. Quorum. A majority of the members of the committee shall constitute a quorum.

Whereas, that process has been successfully completed and five goals have been established;

Now, therefore, be it Resolved by the City Council of the City of Lewiston that the below City Council goals and priorities for 2018 and 2019 are hereby adopted:

Relationship with School Committee

- Meet frequently with School Committee starting in September.
- Work toward an improved, more understandable budget format for Council and citizens
- Cooperate on shared educational goals important to the community, its perception, and our future economic development
- Establish joint metrics to measure progress
- Discuss possibility of establishing a sub-committee to develop information

RESOLVE ACCEPTING A PUBLIC EASEMENT FOR A PORTION OF THE UNACCEPTED PORTION OF COTE STREET

VOTE (180-2018)

Motion by Councilor Lysen, seconded by Councilor Lajoie:

To approve the Resolve Accepting a Public Easement for a portion of the unaccepted portion of Cote Street:

Whereas, the owner of an undeveloped lot on Cote Street southwesterly of Fairmount Street is interested in developing a single family home on this property; and

Whereas, this property needs an additional twenty-five (25) feet of frontage to be a conforming lot; and

Whereas, the City already maintains an additional twenty (20) feet of Cote Street beyond the one hundred seventy five (175) feet currently accepted as a Public Street, and

Whereas, a thirty (30) foot public easement beyond the accepted limit of Cote Street would make the last lot on Cote Street a conforming lot;

Now, therefore, be it Resolved by the City Council of the City of Lewiston that thirty (30) feet of Cote Street, beyond the one hundred seventy –five (175) feet presently accepted south westerly of Fairmount Street, be accepted as a Public Easement.

RESOLVE AUTHORIZING AN EXEMPTION FROM THE CITY’S PURCHASING POLICY REGARDING THE COMPOSITION OF THE SELECTION COMMITTEE TO REVIEW PROPOSALS FOR ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES FOR A FIRE SUBSTATION

VOTE (181-2018)

Motion by Councilor Rea, seconded by Councilor Marcotte:

To approve the Resolve Authorizing an exemption from the City’s Purchasing Policy regarding the composition of the Selection Committee to review proposals for architectural services for a fire substation:

Whereas, the City’s Purchasing Policy sets out the composition of the Selection Review Committee to be used in evaluating proposal responses for Architect, Engineer, and Consultant Services; and

Whereas, such Committees are to consist of the Public Works Director (or designee), two Project Engineers that are not involved with the proposed work, and two members of the Finance Committee, one of whom must be a City Councilor; and

Whereas, while such a Committee works well for the majority of the City’s projects since they regularly involve infrastructure projects, this project involves architectural and engineering work related to developing plans and specifications for constructing a new Fire Station; and

Whereas, given the nature of this project, the Finance Committee has recommended that the selection Committee’s composition be modified to include the Public Works Director (or designee), two Finance Committee members, one of whom must be a City Councilor, one additional Councilor to be appointed by the Mayor, and the Fire Chief;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Lewiston that the composition of the Selection Review Committee required by Section 3.5.2.2 of the City’s Purchasing Rules and Regulations is hereby modified for the Committee to recommend the selection of a consulting firm to develop plans and specifications for construction of a new fire substation. For that project, the Selection Review Committee shall be composed of the Public Works Director (or designee), two Finance Committee members one of whom must be a City Councilor, one additional Councilor to be appointed by the Mayor, and the Fire Chief.

It is further acknowledged that these funds shall be credited to the ‘City of Lewiston Drug Enforcement Program’ account.

Motion by Councilor Lajoie, seconded by Councilor Lysen:

To approve the Resolve authorizing the exemption from the City's Purchasing Policy for the emergency purchase of certain camera equipment for Kennedy Park:

Whereas, the City's Purchasing Policy normally requires that formal bids be sought for all purchases in excess of \$10,000; and

Whereas, the Policy does, however, allow for bypassing the formal bid process in an emergency when public exigency will not permit the delay incident to advertising and when necessary to protect the best interest of the City; and

Whereas, recent events in Kennedy Park have resulted in City staff evaluating the current camera coverage of the park; and

Whereas, as a result of this evaluation, staff is recommending that the current system be expanded and upgraded to enhance park coverage; and

Whereas, funds are available for this purpose from an authorized bond issue of \$150,000 designated for upgrading the City's camera system; and

Whereas, the City has consistently used Norris, Inc. for the purchase, installation, and maintenance of our camera system and they are fully familiar with the equipment that is compatible with it;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Lewiston that

The Council hereby waives the bidding requirement of the City's Purchasing Policy and authorizes the City Administrator to proceed with the emergency purchase of the necessary equipment to upgrade and expand the video coverage of Kennedy Park and to enter into the attached scope of work with Norris, Inc. for this project.
